

Our musical ride will be in transition this year with nine of our riders graduating this year. A sign-up sheet for becoming a member of the Musical Ride will be posted later in the Spring.

Meanwhile for those who would like to consider this opportunity you need to know the following. Riders in rides 1 to 5 who will still be Junior members with Lancers in the Fall may sign up for the Musical Ride. Riders in ride 4 and 5 will be assigned as spare riders, in the event someone needs to miss a practice/performance, unless we don’t otherwise have sufficient numbers to make up the ride. Practices will take place on weekend evenings until school is out, after which they will take place on Wednesday afternoons throughout the summer. Please only sign up if you can commit to these ride times. There are no fees associated with participating in the musical ride.

HORSE NEWS

RIDER LEVELS LECTURE SERIES

Our lecture series to prepare for Equine Canada's Rider Levels lectures have been going well. For those new to riding the Equine Canada Rider Levels are a proficiency system for riders which tests rider skills at ten levels. All lessons at Lancers are taught using the progressive guidelines of the EC Rider Level Program, however, it is not a requirement to be tested. For those who wish to do so the rider level lectures are designed to help prepare riders for testing which is conducted by the Nova Scotia Equestrian Federation.

Testing is a two phase process that begins with a written test that is scheduled for March 26 at the Halifax Central Library. Those who pass their written tests will proceed to their riding and stable management test which is scheduled for April 3 at Lancers. The date to test a handful of candidates for their instructor certification (I.O.B) will be determined soon.

Remember all riders doing their testing will need to have a current NSEF membership, available at www.horsenovascotia.ca. Rider level handbooks can also be purchased through they website.

Lectures will take place on Wednesdays from January to March from 5:30 pm – 6:30 pm in the Mitchell Room. All riders are encouraged to attend.



SALMON RIVER SUMMER CAMP



Session 1 - August 15th - August 19th
Session 2 - August 22nd - August 26th

Cost: \$650 per week

Register by: May 20th, deposit of \$150.00 required with balance due before August 1

There has been a great deal of interest in the Salmon River Summer Camps which will provide Lancer horses with a taste of country life and Lancer riders the opportunity to enjoy a unique camp experience.

During the middle of August all Lancers horses will be transported to Salmon River, NS (just past Truro). Campers will arrive each Monday for the session they have registered in by 10 am. Pick-up time is Friday at 4 pm. Parents are responsible for transporting their children to and from the camp. While at the camp, campers will sleep in a large tent (kids need to bring air mattresses, sleeping bags and their own pillow.) Nutritious meals will be cooked on-site for the campers. Kids will ride twice a day in the ring and also on trails. When not riding there will be games and activities as well as horse related chores. All in all - good healthy fun.

Meanwhile back at Lancers, the barn will undergo clean up and renovations/repairs that are required before the horses return home.

Enrollment is limited so please email the office to let us know if you are interested in participating. A deposit of \$150.00 received by May 20th will hold a space. Note that camp is open to Junior Riders age 10 - 18. Eligible riders aged 8-10 are able to attend if a parent is available to chaperone at the camp.

Morgan enjoys art and music in his downtime. He plays the saw, didgeridoo, jaw harp, tin whistle, bodhran and guitar! While Jack enjoys reining and has his own western horses on his farm in the Valley, where he lives with his wife and two children.

Jack has initiated a clinic to be held at Lancers on March 20 for members of the Atlantic Farrier Association. The clinic will host farriers from across the Maritime Provinces and will feature Dr. Rob Wentzell of South Shore Vet Services, who will take xrays of horses hooves to show whether the joints align properly as they should if the shoe is optimal. Jack thinks that it is important to create a community and share knowledge with his fellow farriers. This clinic is a first for the association and Lancers is proud to host the session. Lancers is also proud to have worked with Jack for over 30 years!

Jack Zeggelaar always knew he wanted to be a farrier. He first saw a horse being shod on his family farm in Weston NS, where he moved with his family from Rocky Mountain House, Alberta when he was nine. Shoeing a horse looked cool although his high school guidance counsellor laughed when he told him that was what he wanted to do for a career. In his characteristic straightforward style, Jack went out and did it anyway.


Fresh from school at age 18, Jack worked with Vince Whelan, a farrier in the Valley. He started shoeing full time when he was 24. He said it was 10 years before he felt proficient in the trade and he says he is still learning. “There are many facets to shoeing a horse. You cannot change how the horse is made but we can shoe the horse to suit the horses conformation so that the joints align properly.” Jack says that proper shoeing is important to a horses comfort and longevity. While he makes a few, most of his shoes come from Europe.

Over the years, Jack has nurtured other people learning the farrier profession. Today, working along side of Jack is Morgan Davison.

Morgan who hails from Ferguson’s Cove NS, studied at Olds College in Olds, Alberta in 2014. He finished his education at Olds in 2015 and is now sub-contracting with Jack. Morgan is also a blacksmith. “I almost went to school to either be an artist or to make architectural tools.” Morgan calls blacksmithing an “addiction” – something that he continues

Barn STARS

What are barn stars?

Barn stars are Lancer members who help out with weekend night hay, the delivery of shavings/ hay and other jobs as required. To recognize our barn stars, each time a Lancer member signs up (and shows up) they will receive a star(s) for their efforts. For every three stars earned your name will be entered into a draw to occur at the end of each month for a semi-private lesson with Barn Manager and Head Instructor Angie Holt. Other prizes will be awarded throughout the year. Draws will occur at the end of each month.

Who can be a barn star?

- Rides 1-4 and adult riders can sign up for weekend night hay
- Rides 5-10 can sign up for night hay if accompanied/mentored by someone from Rides 1-4 or an adult rider
- Anybody who helps with shavings/hay delivery will receive a star
- Barn stars may be rewarded for general awesomeness like mentoring younger riders
